Casino celebrates new milestone

March 2025

Opening events held for Prairie Flower Casino expansion

On February 17, 2025, the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska officially cut the ribbon to open the expanded Prairie Flower Casino. A private open house was held the day before, on February 16, to let members view and experience the expansion before the Casino opened to the public. The new expansion increases the gaming floor square footage by seven-fold, triples the total number of gaming positions, adds a sportsbook, and ushers in Las Vegas-style electronic table games.

"The expansion of Prairie Flower Casino is a milestone event for the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska, as it represents a future that offers more sustainable funding for critical Tribal programs that serve our members, like healthcare, transportation, job training, cultural preservation, and the delivery of meals for elders," said Ponca Tribe of Nebraska Chairwoman Candace Schmidt. "We appreciate the partnership of the City of Carter Lake, our dedicated staff who helped make this possible, and most importantly, our members, elders, and ancestors whose sacrifices and perseverance led the Tribe to this celebratory day."





The Tribe's history and culture are noticeable throughout the facility. The casino's street address, 1031 Avenue H, and the name of the main bar inside, Bar 1031, is a nod to the date in which the federal government restored the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska - October 31st, 1990. Inside, artwork made by Ponca Tribe of Nebraska member Terry Taylor will hang on the walls.

"Prairie Flower Casino staff are thrilled to welcome our loyal guests and new patrons into this exciting, new, expanded casino. With hundreds of new slot machines, expanded dining and drink menus, a sportsbook, and electronic table games like blackjack, roulette, poker, and craps, our guests are going to love the entertainment variety in what will feel like a boutique gaming facility," said Prairie Flower Casino General Manager Ernie Dellaverson.

The expanded casino, located adjacent to the existing facility, will be open 24 hours. The original casino facility, which opened on November 1, 2018, will transition to an administrative and back-office workspace.

Honoring Native women in conservation & science

March is Women's History Month, and the Environmental Department is highlighting women who have had impacts on conservation and science. For instance, Winona LaDuke. Winona LaDuke is an indigenous woman of the Ojibwe Tribe in Minnesota. Winona founded the White Earth Land Recovery Project, which is an organization that helps buy land to give back to reservations to use and create more environmentally friendly practices. One of her many environmental passions is sustainable development, meaning to create an environment that can be usable for many generations to come. Renewable energy is another one of Winona's focuses, which is a concern for native people. Renewable resources are needed for the creation of a healthier environment and with the cost and complexity, native populations are having a difficult time finding ways to be more renewable to keep up with the future. Winona helps to do this by purchasing land to use for windmills that help establish renewable culture in tribes. Food sustainability is another topic Winona is trying to improve, because of climate change,

food supplies and food production are at risk. She also helped encourage tribal members to eat traditional foods which helps with sustainability, and the Type 2 Diabetes rates among tribes. Along with that, Winona advocates for the protection of watersheds to keep natural water bodies and our drinking water safe to consume. Winona led the 2016 Dakota Access Pipeline protests to protect the water access in indigenous lands of North Dakota. Winona is a big advocate for environmental science but is also heavily involved in the returning of native lands, politics, and women empowerment. Moving forward together! Native women educating and inspiring generations

The Ponca Tribe of Nebraska's Domestic Violence department is eager to celebrate all the women we have in our lives during this year's National Women's History Month. During the month of March, we give a little extra attention to all the amazing accomplishments of strong, determined women. Every woman has a story to tell and gifts to share with the world. So, get ready, because this month is about honoring magnificent ladies, and we are ready to celebrate it to the fullest.

March is Women's History Month, and March 8 is International Women's Day, so we wanted to highlight inspiring Native American women who have impacted the world around them, both past and present. The historical significance of Native American women is one of beauty and power.

For 2025, the National Women's History Alliance (NWHA) proudly presents the theme "Moving Forward Together! Women Educating & Inspiring Generations." This theme celebrates the collective strength and influence of women who have dedicated their lives to education, mentorship, and leadership. Through their efforts, they have served as an inspiration for all generations both past and present.

Ada Deer was one of



the most prominent Native political activists of our time. She was an outspoken opponent of tribal termination in the 1970s and continued in her work as a scholar and an advocate for Native rights until her passing on August 14, 2023. Ada had a long and extremely accomplished career. In 1974, she was the first woman to serve as Chair of the Menominee Restoration Committee. From 1993-1997, she was the first Native woman to serve as the

Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs at the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior.

Ada had a distinguished political career. She ran for Wisconsin Secretary of State in both 1978 and 1982 and served as vicechair of the 1984 Mondale-Ferraro presidential campaign. In 1992, she ran for a U.S. Congressional seat in Wisconsin's Second District, winning the Democratic primary without soft money funding from political action committees. She taught in the School of Social Work at the University of Wisconsin-Madison since 1977 and held the title of Distinguished Lecturer and was the director of the American Indian Studies Department at UW Madison since 1999. She co-founded Milwaukee's Indian Community School. She also created the first program at the University to provide social work training on Native American reservations. She was a fellow at the Harvard Institute of Politics at the John F. Kennedy School of Gov-

Forward Together: Honoring women who have empowered others

ernment, Harvard University. Mall in Washington, D.C. In 2008, upon her death,

Mary Golda Ross was the first known Native American female engineer and the first female



engineer in the history of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation. Mary, who began working for Lockheed in 1942, helped design the P-38 fighter plane. She was one of the 40 founding engineers and the only Native American and the only woman on the team of Lockheed's highly secretive Advanced Development Programs, which became known as the Skunk Works Project. She is best remembered for her work on the aerospace design. She worked at Lockheed until her retirement in 1973.

During her retirement, Mary worked to recruit young women and Native Americans to engineering careers. At the age of 96, she participated in the opening ceremonies of the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian on the National Mall in Washington, D.C. In 2008, upon her death, Mary left a \$400,000 endowment to the Museum. In 2019, Mary was depicted on the \$1 coin by the U.S. Mint as they celebrated American Indians in the Space Program.

Henrietta Mann, Southern Cheyenne, is a celebrated activist, educator, professor, and leading figure in



developing programs devoted to Native American studies. As an elected Tribal Councilor for the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes, she helped author federal legislation that resulted in a \$15 million settlement from the US government in 1967 as part of the Indian Claims Commission. Mann has been integral in developing Native American studies at colleges and universities nationwide. In 2000, she became the first Native



The Tribal Council is seeking individuals who want to serve on the Judicial Nominating Committee. The Judicial Nominating Committee shall consist of five members, with each district having at least one representative on the Committee. The Committee is responsible to select from applicants those persons they deem to be gualified to serve as Judges of the Court and Justices of the Appellate Court. The Ponca Tribal Council then conducts an open hearing for each nominated person and then selects from the candidates the Chief Judge and three Appellate Justices. Those serving on this Committee will be paid a stipend in the amount of \$250 and mileage reimbursement up to 410 miles roundtrip at the GSA rates per meeting.
